Resilience through empowerment:

exploring the effective pathways to empowering the most vulnerable when responding to the emerging opportunities and risks of our world and its rapidly changing climate.



Transparency and downward accountability:

examining the ways in which decisions are made, climate responses are prioritised and climate finance is directed to ensure it delivers the intended benefits to vulnerable populations and supports a more robust global stocktake for adaptation.



Valuing lived experience and local knowledge:

highlighting the opportunities that local and traditional knowledge give us to inform local, regional and national policy discussions related to climate and development.



Financing adaptation and managing risk:

championing solutions that remove barriers to prevent climate finance reaching those more vulnerable to climate change, while integrating risk management approaches to help improve resilience.

They share how food, water, landscape and livelihoods have changed since they were kids. And what makes them hopeful for the future. Then, the conversation turns to you! You can add your voice, and help reveal the human faces of 1.5°C.

Field remediations: SALVAGE

What comes after consumption? Meet the Polish sourdough bacteria, catch a ride with milk to the conference, explore closing the carbon cycle.

Field Remediation: Salvage is a collection of books, recipes, and objects from sites of the Polish food system, and a set of activities that puts Silesians and COP participants in direct dialogue. The collection is distributed in food delivery vehicles in Silesia: catch a ride to the conference in one of these mobile libraries, and sample and learn about the past and the future of the Polish fermentation microbiota, wine industry, food preservation techniques and other wild possibilities of salvage.
